NEW BOOK ARRIVALS

<u>Italian Short Stories for Beginners</u> and <u>Italian Short Stories for Intermediate Learners</u>

These books are a fun way to strengthen your reading skills. Each book has eight short "unconventional" stories to keep your interest. I am far from fluent in Italian, but I was able to read the book for beginners.

Death and the Olive Grove

A murder mystery by Italian writer Marco Vichi, translated

into English. While not a mystery aficionado, I read the book in January and thoroughly enjoyed it. Detective Bordello is a complex character living in Florence, full of vices yet likable. He desperately hunts for the killer of little girls, hampered by flashbacks of his fighting days in WWII, and inadvertently crossing paths with Nazis who are on the run from their Nuremberg sentences. The book is not complementary to Germans.


There is a nice sense of being in the city, with a fun nod to the food. You might even borrow a map from the library to follow along as he crisscrosses Florence, naming the streets as he goes. A short "Notes" section provides insights into life in Florence.

One of those notes reintroduced me to the song "Tu vuò fa l'americano." ("You want to be an American.") You can see a lively 1956 video of Renato Carosone and his band performing the song on YouTube, including a translation.

North Beach: The Italian Heart of San Francisco

In English, the extensive text is supplemented with many photos. It traces the evolution of the Italian center of the city from Telegraph Hill to North Beach.

The images are from photographer J B Monaco (1856-1938). He specialized in portraits, but his "avocation was recording the life around him." This carefully curated collection documents daily life in the Italian neighborhoods. Many photos have never been published. There are photos of the aftermath of the 1906 earthquake and the rebuilding of the neighborhoods.


Our Italian Language Collection

## GENEVIEVE SCRIVANO SO MANY FOND MEMORIES

Over the holidays, we were saddened to hear of the passing of Genevieve "Gen" Scrivano on November 27th. For a key period in the life of the IAHF during the 1980's through the 1990's, she was the receptionist and secretary at the IAHF. Many of you old time members of the IAHF may recall her and her smile that represented the IAHF to the public. Gen, along with past IAHF President and later IAHF Coordinator Sal Scrivano, were a dynamic duo at the Foundation, and both were an important transition from some of the IAHF's early founders to the organization it is today.

Genevieve also served as a consultant to the "Young Italian Club" within the Foundation and had a "sunshine column" in the newsletter, keeping members informed of the goings on in our community. Some of the young Italians of the day attended the memorial service at Saint Lucy's. I fondly recall Sal and Gen driving into the Foundation parking

At that time, the IAHF had 3 office staff in addition to the treasurer, a secretary, a coordinator and a handyman. While both Genevieve and Sal were born in New York City, Gen was from Manhattan and Sal was from Brooklyn. They met at Coney Island in Brooklyn.



The rest as they say is history, but sometimes when I just said Brooklyn to Gen, I was reminded she was from Manhattan.

Genevieve is survived by a sister in New York and five loving children, Mary Ann, Louis, Carolyn, Frank, Jeanette, and their families. The dynamic duo of Sal and Genevieve were amazing to watch, and always a critical part of the life of the IAHF, especially during Festa season. Their dedication to the IAHF for so many years helped make the organization the vibrant foundation it is today.

In memory of both Sal and Genevieve, a long overdue memorial scholarship is being established for 2025. You may donate online by choosing the

Scrivano Memorial Scholarship. It is also a timely reminder that as an organization we are membership driven so we hope the spirit of Sal and Gen inspires you to volunteer too. Both Gen and Sal left us with an amazing legacy. Our condolences to the family and with a special admiration for lives well lived.

My Father's House

By Joseph O'Connor ~

My Father's House by Joseph O'Connor is a remarkable work of literature which reveals the accomplishments of a brave, dedicated and utterly unique Irish-born priest, Monsignor Hugh O'Flaherty. The entire novel takes place over a short period of time

during the horrendous days of the occupation of Rome by the Germans in the midst of World War II.

In order to protect itself, the Vatican, under Pope Pius XII declared neutrality. Under no circumstances could any resident participate in any humanitarian work that countermanded Nazi authority. Pope Pius made it abundantly clear to Monsignor O'Flaherty that his efforts on behalf of prisoners and escapees were strictly forbidden and that he stood to be expelled from the Vatican should he continue. The Pope's great fear is that the Nazis would take over the Vatican and abscond with its priceless art treasures as they were doing all over their conquered lands. Pope Pius XII paid a heavy price for his earlier collaboration with Mussolini.

My Father's House shares with us that Father O'Flaherty's audacity is directly disobeying the Pope to achieve his

goal of bringing thousands of detainees and escapees to safety, many of them Jewish. Beyond bravery, his brilliance in planning is revealed in every chapter. First, Monsignor O'Flaherty formed a choir of carefully chosen and very dissimilar individuals who agree to meet in the neutral zone of the Vatican to practice and sing exquisite choral music. They do sing, but it's a ruse. The Monsignor goes from individual to individual whispering their specific assignment or mission. They are never addressed by name, but by their part in the choir such as alto or tenor. There is the constant fear of being overheard which would result in immediate death by gunshot, so the choir practice must be authentic.

The structure of the novel is unique and demonstrates the skill of the author. Each participant in the escape scheme shares his or her story in the first person... sometimes through transcripts of interviews, or memoir or simply straightforward narrative. The writing style changes to fit the temperament and personality and class of each participant and this speaks to O'Connor's exceptional talent. Only Monsignor O'Flaherty's story is told in the third person. This seems to be appropriate since each participant is talking about the Monsignor and his plans for them and the escape route. So, even though they are all indispensable participants, Monsignor O'Flaherty remains the focal point of the action.

The brave group is formed as a choir to camouflage themselves from the Nazis. But the choir is also metaphorical as these individuals all have to work in precise harmony in order to produce the desired outcome. The outcome is the masterpiece of saving thousands of lives and Monsignor O'Flaherty is the composer and conductor.

My Father's House is classified as historical fiction, not biography. Author O'Connor presents his fictional versions of those worthy and brave individuals who actually worked his escape line. The writing is masterful, and the information is something we should all know.

# Congratulations Maria Gloria

Newspaper columnist for the L' Italo-Americano, Maria Gloria has retired after 47 years of reporting on the Italian American scene in the San Francisco Bay Area and beyond. She has also been a member of the IAHF during this same time - which makes her one of the most tenured members of the Foundation. She has always been very gracious in calling attention to our events throughout the State and nation through her column with the L'Italo Americano.

Maria represents a dynamic group of members, who live a distance away from Santa Clara County, and use the Foundation to keep in touch with their heritage. Maria Gloria lives in San Francisco and remarkably can multitask, along with her husband Tony, with several regional Italian American organizations. She is on the Advisory Board of another great institution, Il Museo Italo Americano at Ft Mason, in San Francisco. In common parlance, Maria Gloria "walks the talk," and has been a longtime supporter of IAHF events, donating raffle prizes, serving as a donor and vendor for the Festa, and providing materials for our library and archival works. Her retirement is certainly going to leave a network vacuum among so many parts of the community.

The editor of L'Italo Americano, Simone Schiavinato, wrote in a fond editorial, "Thank you, Maria Gloria! Now it's up to all of us to write what it means to be Italian American." (Thursday, October 31, 2024) So, with the new year comes a challenge or rededication to pick up where Maria Gloria's retirement begins. In many ways, that is a part of the reason the IAHF took on the initiative of the Italifornian website and blog. It is free and open to all and an online option to continue the work Maria Gloria has been so involved in.

On a more personal note, it was through Maria Gloria's connection in NYC that I was able to contact Alfio to participate in our Festa. I truly appreciated all the publicity she gave my cookbook, Flavors from A Calabrese Kitchen in the 1980's. It literally opened a new world for me.

Maria Gloria helped restore a mural in her father's hometown of Pomarico, Prov. di Matera, Basilicato. Several of our chair plaques also have the name Pomarico on the back, thanks to Maria Gloria's donations. And we were excited to recently have her, her husband and daughter with us at the A16 field trip in San Francisco.

I am sure I am only touching the surface of her activities. I know Maria Gloria's work will continue but sadly not in the form of her column in the Italo Americano. So, a celebratory "un abbraccio" for this amazing accomplishment and equally amazing member of the IAHF.
