













SARAH BRIGHTMAN Live

The IAHF is in the planning stages of developing a field trip and tour of the Italian Cemetery in Colma. Colma is a little south of San Francisco. We had started discussions about visiting the site about two years ago, in our genealogy classes organized by the Cultural Committee. We will make it happen this spring, hopefully on a Saturday in March, followed by a lunch at a restaurant in the area.

In helping us plan for the event, please call the IAHF at 408-293-7122 if you are interested in going and put your name on our Sign Up List and we will contact you for further for details. We will take into consideration the weather, as it may impact the field trip too. Lunch will be optional. The anticipated time will be around 11:30 to 1:30 on a Saturday. We are also trying to plan for a rider pool for those who are unable to drive to the location. It is about an hour from San Jose, off 280 North.

For those who may not be aware, the Italian Cemetery in Colma is unique in that it is only one of its kind in the nation. It was founded in the

1860's by the Italian Community in San Francisco and is fully operational even today. It houses many old time settlers, including Italian 49ers who "sailed around the horn" to join the gold rush, and became the first Italian settlers in North Beach. I recall my grandmother telling me that funerals in those days were a whole day affair with the procession going from North Beach via Mission St. to Colma, in horse and buggy, and of course enough food and home made wine to sustain the family for the entire day. In those days too The Outer Mission and Colma areas were truck farming areas.


There are many fascinating tales associated with the site. Actually, Colma is in itself an historic town that houses many of the major cemeteries for San Francisco, and one of my favorite t-shirts is inscribed, "Alive in Colma!" Saint Valentine, officially known as Saint Valentine of Rome, is a third-century Roman saint widely celebrated on February 14 and commonly associated with "courtly love."

Although not much of St. Valentine's life is reliably known, and whether or not the stories involve two different saints by the same name is also not officially decided, it is highly agreed that St. Valentine was martyred and then buried on the Via Flaminia to the north of Rome. There is a sepulcher in the catacombs bearing his name.

In 1969, the Roman Catholic Church removed St. Valentine from the General Roman Calendar, because so little is known about him. However, the church still recognizes him as a saint, listing him in the February 14 spot of Roman Martyrology.

Pope Julius I, 337 AD built a church near Ponte Mole in his memory, which for a long time gave name to the gate now called Porta del Popolo, formerly, Porta Valentini.



The romantic nature of Valentine's Day may have derived during the Middle Ages, when people noticed that birds paired couples in mid-February. According to English 18th-century antiquarians Alban Butler and Francis Douce, Valentine's Day was most likely created to provide a Christian substitute for the Roman holiday, Lupercalia.

Although the exact origin of the holiday is not widely agreed upon, it is universally recognized as a day for love, devotion and romance.

Whoever he was, Valentine did really exist, because archaeologists not only unearthed his Roman catacomb but also an ancient church dedicated to St. Valentine. In 496 AD Pope Gelasius marked February 14th

as a celebration in honor of his martyrdom.

On Thursday, February 21, our Regional Lunch will celebrate Matera, in honor of the town being designated a Cultural Capital of Europe for 2019. Matera Sasso, a historical district featuring a cave dwelling neighborhood of continual residency for over 2,000 years, is also designated a UNESCO World Heritage Site. Matera is located in the Province of Basilicata, and while the capitol of the province is Potenza, much of its regional cultural heart is the historic area in and around Matera. The town is also in proximity to Tricarico, where many of our local residents trace their roots. In and around the region are many old and historic communities that will be offering events and attractions to follow up on the activities occurring in Matera during this year-long celebration.

The Tricarico Club also co-sponsors the yearly Polenta Dinner Event with us at the IAHF. This year the Polenta Dinner will be on Saturday, March 2.

Also, at the Regional Lunch we are in the process of securing a video made especially about Matera as a European Cultural Capitol, along with the cave dwellings. Maria Gloria, an IAHF member from San Francisco, traces her roots to the same area, and is also actively working in the region through family members to restore a series of medieval frescoes in time for the regional celebrations. She

has already sent for the videos and we are promised a copy for our events! Saying all this, about three years ago I visited the area, and found it amazing, and even wondered why so little was known about the area and why it is off the tourist map. Actually, what peeked my interest in the region was a talk about the area by Tony Amato at a Regional Lunch several years ago. Visiting Matera is a unique, unforgettable experience. 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






Leonardo da Vinci by Walter Issacson

For anyone at all interested in the human phenomenon known as <u>Leonardo Da Vinci</u>, this book is a must for your reading list. The author,



Walter Isaacson, is a Professor of History at Tulane University in New Orleans; also my alma mater. In addition, he wrote three other prominent biographies, about Steve Jobs, Benjamin Franklin, and Albert Einstein. All of those books including Leonardo Da Vinci ended up in the New York Times bestseller list for non-fiction. If you think about it, all of these men could be considered multi talented, creative, and set the bar for excellence in their fields of endeavor.

To say Isaacson has a knack for historical sleuthing would be an understatement. His research for

the book was a tour de force. He reviewed all of Leonardo's notebooks, writings, and other historical sources and gives you, the reader, a vital dimension into the genius of Leonardo. In addition, the book is richly illustrated with pages from Leonardo's notebooks and locations from his life. The book also highlights two other important realities in Leonardo's world: his survival skills, and life in the Renaissance. Within that historical setting Leonardo became the true prototype of the "Renaissance man".

Leonardo is hard to pigeonhole: was he first and foremost an artist, military engineer, graphic designer, scientist, naturalist, poet, entertainer, event producer or all of the above? Exploring Leonardo's insatiable curiosity would be challenging under normal circumstances. When you take into consideration the turbulence of the Renaissance, where a minor indiscretion, unfortunate remark or taking the wrong political side of an issue could literally cost you your life, you begin to appreciate Leonardo's truly greatest talent, his survival skills!

Reading this biography of Leonardo is an engaging experience. It took me about two months to complete since the book is 550 pages long. It was an engaging and enjoyable experience. It also reminded me of another glimpse into the life of Leonardo, when the City of San Jose hosted a world-class exhibit of Leonardo the technician at the Tech Museum in downtown San Jose, and featured many of the actual replicas of the inventions noted in Isaacson's book, including some of the actual pages in Leonardo's notebook (the IAHF was given a special tour of the exhibit).

Another reason it took me a while to read the book is that this is not the first biography I have read about Leonardo, so at times I would be debating with the author's interpretation of issues and events. For me that is the mark of a great read, and material for a great book club discussion. While I still have my debates with the author especially about his treatment of another classic about Leonardo, Sigmund Freud's Leonardo da Vinci and a Memory of His Childhood, if you are only able to read one book about Leonardo this is the one. It is in all the local libraries, bookstores and readily available for your perusal and by arrangement I would be happy to lend my copy, too, via our IAHF Library.

IAHF REGIONAL LUNCH: Molise

On January 24, the IAHF held its first monthly Regional Lunch of 2019. The region featured was Molise, which is a quiet, mountainous region on the Adriatic side of Italy. A delicious Molisan lunch was prepared by the dedicated IAHF kitchen volunteers, and the attendees loved the antipasto, beet and apple salad, lentil soup, pasta with rapini, cici in tomato sauce, a fabulous baked eggplant and a wonderful ricotta torte for dessert. During dessert and coffee, John Romano (that's me), whose family is from Molise, showed some PowerPoint slides and a 4-minute movie I made about the region. There were several attendees at the luncheon with Molisan heritage who had meaningful and touching stories to share about relatives and Molisan customs. Of course, the Regional Lunches in general are an incredible goldmine of family tradition and knowledge.

55% of Molise is mountains, and less than 1% of the population of Italy lives there. The area is famous for *tratturi*, an ancient series of paths and trails that herdsmen still use today to move their cows, goats and sheep from pasture to pasture. The Molisan coast is short but lovely, with seafood delicacies and recreation, and famous for its award-winning clean water and beaches.









Molise draws vacationers from across Europe becasuse of its diverse geography. As a result, the region is modernizing, but slowly. Folks there have Internet access and mobile phone service (depending where you are, of course). And blue jeans. But Molise is steeped in many old traditions and customs that are still observed today: rolling a wheel of cheese around the perimeter of a town, a favorite Eutruscan contest; engaged couples jumping over fires on St. John's Day to ensure happiness and fertility; wearing a sprig of basil behind the ear on St. Nicholas' Day to get a kiss; lighting bonfires and carrying torches from church to church on Christmas Eve, to name a few. Although the meaning of many of these traditions may have lessened over time, these customs are a part of the fabric that make up and hold together the people of Molise.

As with any Italian, food is love in Molise. Being primarily agrarian, Molise produces excellent food products. Molisan olive oil is considered to be some of the finest in Europe, its pears are reknown, and the area produces specialties like black and white truffles, saffron, and licorice. Pasta is a mainstay, of course, along with lamb and pork. Molisan wines are starting to appear on American shelves as the wine industry there picks up some steam, but slowly, of course - it's Molise.
