HERITAGE IS TODAY and SAN JOSE

As an Italian American Heritage Foundation/organization, one of our major efforts has been to preserve our history and traditions. What we sometimes overlook in this process is that our efforts and today's achievements are also part of our history and expanding legacy. We have in our library archives a bound edition of about ten years of our first IAHF Newspapers. It captures the fact that over the years so many people have participated in the on-going dialogue about our Italian American community. It also highlights the importance in sustaining and nurturing not just our Italian and Italian-American roots, but today's changing face and interests of our diverse Italian American Community. We do not use the term "Italian American Community" much, but in reality there is such a network, although not readily identified by geography, certainly in interest and commitment.

As a point of speculation I wonder how, 35 years from now, others will judge our activities and achievements. What will our legacy be? Much of this challenge will come from understanding the diversity in today's Italian American Community. This includes our first generation immigrants through to our 4th, 5th and 6th generation Italian Americans who choose to identify with that part of their Italian ancestry which they consider vibrant and relevant to their daily lives. Earlier this month, for example, IAHF Board members Linda Filice, Corrado Russo and myself, participated in a Diversity Day Celebration at the County Building. The vision of this event was simple: "Unity in Diversity, Many Cultures, Many Communities" and a sense of the richness of Santa Clara County was very much evident during the festivities. Having an Italian American exhibit at the festivities, and talking to hundreds of people in the community about our heritage, was exciting. It would have been more thrilling if we could have fielded a dance troop like some of the other community organizations. Even so, the point should not be lost that for us to keep our heritage out there and make people want to identify and enjoy our heritage, we as an organization have to move beyond preaching to the choir and become a vibrant part of the community in general, and, as one of our retreat goals noted, be a part of our own neighborhood. We all need ownership of this legacy, and become cultural ambassadors, less the Hollywood stereotypes fill the void.

The month of June will provide some excellent opportunities to share our history, and our roll in the community with two key events: the Festa della Repubblica, and Benefit for Opera San Jose. Each event in its own right are part of our networking function. The keynote speaker at our Festa della Repubblica luncheon, Vice President of the Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors, Dave Cortese, will speak upon common goals within the Italian American Community. This will be a great opportunity to participate and reflect upon the importance of collaboration and cooperation within our own community, while the benefit for Opera San Jose, now in its 22 year, is a fine example of our on-going support of the arts, especially those things Italian. Invite a friend to either activity. The importance of these task can not be over stated. We are not just past history; heritage is being built "oggi"!

Another critical example of "HERITAGE IS TODAY", is of course our 30th Italian

Festa, located in proximity to an emerging Little Italy initiative, the heart of San Jose's historic Little Italy neighborhood, and to dream for the future, a home of a United Italian Cultural Center. Likewise at the Festa, we also want to integrate the theme of "heritage for today", by incorporating history walks, oral histories of members of our communities, and a family reunion area. You, your families and friends are a part of this history. Your contribution to the initiative is vital to today's heritage, so consider how you can help support the cultural life of our on-going rich traditions.

I want to conclude this article with a new beginning, in the sense of a reformatting of our IAHF NEWS. Under the editorship of Primo Public Relations Director Judy Verona Joseph, and an emerging dynamic duo for the IAHF with Graphic Artist John Romano, we are tooling up for a more relevant newspaper for our member's interests and activities. A special "grazie tante" for their professionalism and commitment. At the same time, it is vital to establish an Email contact list in order to make available to you, the reader, the latest news about our Italian American Heritage. You will not find this information in the mainstream media, yet, throughout the Bay Area, exciting and relevant events and activities are occurring weekly. The IAHF NEWS is a part of this communication network, but given today's media revolution, our paper is not the most effective way to inform you about what's going on in our community. The electronic media revolution is breathing new life to the meaning of "Italianita" around the bay! Our job is to share with you this information, and we are really behind the curve in this respect. We hope to rectify that shortly with the establishment of our Email news alerts. More on that shortly, and of course, we welcome your help with that project, too.

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
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Sons of Sicily Golf Tournament

Luigi Del Bianco

honored at Italian American Museum

A permanent exhibit showcasing Luigi Del Bianco's work as Chief Carver on Mount Rushmore is now on display at the Italian American Museum on 155 Mulberry St in Little Italy, New York.

It was Gutzon Borglum, the designer of the memorial, who hired Del Bianco in 1933 to be the Chief Carver of the m o n u m e n t and to bring "refinements of expression" to the four



faces. Luigi fulfilled that role by carving the fine features of the presidents and bringing them to life. "Bianco" also saved the face of Jefferson by repairing a dangerous crack in his lip; a job Borglum would entrust to no one else. In his own words, Gutzon wrote this about Luigi Del Bianco: "He is worth any three men in America for this type of work".

Unfortunately, most of the major publications about Mount Rushmore don't even mention Luigi Del Bianco. Because of this oversight, Luigi's son Caesar and his grandson Lou have made it a mission over the years to tell a story that needs to be told: that an Italian immigrant came to America to help bring to life our nation's greatest memorial.

Dr. Joseph Scelsa of the Italian American Museum recognized this need as well. As a result, a display with original photographs and artwork of the gifted stone carver is now available to the public.

The Mighty Caper of Pantelleria

Pantelleria, Sicily - "Un cappero al giorno...toglie il medico di torno." (A Caper a day, keeps the doctor away.)

You can't say that you know that island of Pantelleria off of Sicily, if you never eaten its fantastic capperi: so tiny and tasty and so strange. Capers are extremely important for the region economically and for this inaccessible



island, whose dry climate has turned out to be the best place for cultivating them. Indeed, thousands of caper plants cover the rocky territory of the island; you catch sight of their tiny pinkish-violet colored flowers everywhere you go. The plants grow clinging onto steep rocks or on the ruins of old Dammusi (the local stone rural houses).

The caper itself is a flower bud that is picked before it actually blooms. It is then made to ripen in individual tubs and covered by sea salt. In this way, the caper acquires that strong, peculiar taste that so characterizes the cuisine of the island.

In the culture of the ancient people of the Mediterranean, it was believed that the caper had aphrodisiacal and therapeutic properties. Even today, scientific studies have demonstrated that capers have special diuretic and digestive qualities as well as being good for the liver and the circulatory system. But that's not all, capers boast anti-age properties for the skin and can protect it from excessive sun exposure, granting it greater elasticity.



Capers are also prescribed to individuals who suffer from constipation and to those who need a little pick-me-up after a bout of drinking, helping them recover mentally and physically. Capers are also said to have psycho-therapeutic properties similar to those ascribed to Bach flower remedies, increasing the ability for decision-making and decreasing insecurity. Last but not least, capers have anti-allergic properties against irritations caused by insect bites, jelly fish stings, and heat rashes.

That's some little caper!

A Tip on the Use of Lemons

If you have access to a lemon tree, and, of course, I cannot resist the pun, if life gives you lemons, make Limoncello and Lemon ice! This recipe comes from an IAHF friend, Lawrence DeSantis.

Note: He uses "Everclear" and not Vodka - it can be purchased at Beverages and More.

Limoncello (Lemon Liqueur)

- № 750 ml Everclear (reserve about a 1/4)...Pure grain alcohol works the best. In Italy I was told 190 proof was ideal.
- A Seven (7) lemons...organic, without pesticides
- r Two (2) cups water
- rwo (2) cups sugar

Wash lemons, bath in ice water for about an hour. I use Eureka with very little green on the skin. Using a peeler, remove the rind, NO WHITE PART (it is bitter), and put it in 3/4 of the Everclear, in a big enough jar with a tight lid. The rind is a very critical predictor on the quality of the liqueur. Store in a cool dark place and gently stir (without opening jar) once daily...for (7) days. After, strain through cheese cloth to discard rind. Add remaining 1/4 of Everclear.

In a saucepan (preferably non-reactive) add water and sugar and simmer for 15 min. Cool to room temperature then add to lemon alcohol.

Store in a dark cool place for (2) weeks and stir gently occassionally. (Try if you like.)

Bottle and enjoy. Note: It is best stored in the freezer and served very cold.

Lemon Ice

 \approx Squeeze juice from the seven (7) lemons above.

Add the lemon juice to a sugar syrup made from:

ℯ Six (6) cups of water

✤ Four (4) cups of sugar (you can add more sugar if you want it sweeter)
♠ Simmer for 15 to 30min.

Place in freezer and stir with a fork or egg beater every 15 min. until ready.

Dominic Catalano: One Member's Recollection

As plans are underway to celebrate the Festa della Repubblica on June 3rd, we have a timely recollection from one of our members, Dominic Catalano. Dominic lived through those stormy times as a student and teacher at the University of Catania, Sicilia, and growing up in Messina, Sicilia. He returned to the USA in 1947. Even though he grew up in Sicilia, Dominic was born in Lassen County, California, where his parents immigrated to work in the lumber industry. His parents returned to Sicilia to raise their family.

As an aside, the area around Lassen County during the turn of the century, especially in McCloud, California, was the site of much labor unrest and a major strike of Italian immigrant workers. The Consul General of Italy was brought in to mediate the strike, and that is for another article. The following is a summary of Dominic's article.

Immigration After the 2nd World War

The Second World War devastated Europe for many years. Italy suffered thousands of deaths and disabilities and millions injured and displaced.



In Italy the period after the war was very hard: heavy public debts, inflation, high prices, and unemployment for millions of veterans, uncertainties in the ruling class, strikes, and other conflicts. The war ended on April 25, 1945. On February 10th 1947 the peace treaty was signed in Paris. Italy had to accept consider-

able loss of territory. The peace treaty also included a formal waiver of all rights to her colonies. Libya became independent. Eritrea was joined in a federation with Ethiopia and Somalia {and certain territories in Eastern Italy were ceded to Yugoslavia}.

When the war ended but before the peace treaty was signed, elections were held on June 2, 1946 for a Constitutional Assembly, which would draft a new Constitution for Italy. On that same date a referendum was held which permitted the people to directly choose between the monarchy and a republic. The majority of voters chose the Republic. Last year we heard about that epoch from Dr. Mario Fusco, our keynote speaker at last year's Festa della Repubblica luncheon.

The new republican constitution was promulgated on Dec. 27, 1947. Enrico DeNicola was appointed the first president of the republic. Even so, Italy's problems were great; there was war devastation, hunger, unemployment and great suffering. As a result of this many Italians started to immigrate

and the United States was the first choice. Even so, it was a complicated process, and many Italians opted to immigrate to Canada.

As a consequence of this post war migration, these immigrants have contributed and are contributing to the welfare of the United States in many capacities. They also moved beyond the normal immigrant centers and were more dispersed though out the United States. The history of this



nation, California, and Santa Clara County has been one of a "melting pot". Our many diverse and ethnic cultures melded and worked together to produce a quality of life in our respective communities that is now recognized across the nation.

Tremendous strides have been made but much more needs to be done. While we live in a much more enlightened society today it continues to be our responsibility to remain ever vigilant. Barriers, discrimination and obstacles have not been completely eradicated, and in some instances have become more subtle even in today's society.

Even so, our successes has been achieved through a better understanding that unity fostered by a belief in common goals and objectives brings strength and progress. Regardless of our field of endeavor our profession the mantle of responsibility passes to us to uphold the same principles, goals and objectives of our parents and forefathers.(Coincidently, Dominic touch's upon the theme of our keynote speaker of this years Festa della Repubblica Lunch. The Honorable. Dave Cortese, Vice President of the SCC Board of Supervisors will speak on Common Goals in the Italian American Community.


